Deborah is honored and delighted to receive this award and appreciates the positive publicity that will result for One Heart Bulgaria.



Executive director back from Bulgaria

One Heart director Deborah Gardner had a wonderful trip to Bulgaria this Spring. She was able to gather a lot of updated information, make several new contacts, develop new ideas for programs, and participate in some incredible hands-on humanitarian experiences. A special "thank-you" for making this trip possible goes to Shawn Nielsen, who sponsored the flight expenses, and Marvin Gardner, who covered all other travel costs.

While in Bulgaria, Deborah met with several people interested in One Heart's work: the LDS humanitarian missionaries and mission president, our two One Heart "Babas" (the grandmothers hired to help care for children), the Ridgeways from "Bulgarian Child," all of the doctors and nurses from the Texas medical mission, several orphanage directors, and Dr. Gavazov (a cousin of our field director, Nickolai) who works at the hospital where all of the shunt surgeries were performed. She also hired a full time doctor to work with the children in the Slaveikov orphanage.



One of the highlights of Deborah's trip was the opportunity she had to be involved in the care of several sick children who received shunts through One Heart. She spent several hours tending to the needs of two small children who received shunts, helping with their preoperative and post-operative care. She also was asked to be present during the actual operation on one child, a little 6-year-old boy who developed hydrocephalus after being severely beaten by his parents.

One Heart donor (and mother of a current LDS missionary in Bulgaria) Carol Tuttle accompanied Deborah on this trip. Carol's fundraising efforts furnished much of the funding necessary to replace the windows and doors in Slaveikov, the largest orphanage in Bulgaria. What a change! Deborah and Carol were even invited to spend the night, and they can tell you from first hand experience that the doors and windows work fine—and they are a huge improvement. No more drafts, and plenty of privacy and security for the children. Deborah spent time interviewing some of the teenagers and handing out treats and knick-knacks.

As a wonderful way to finish off her trip, Deborah was able to attend a traditional dance performance by the children in the Bratsigovo orphanage—their recreational program, which includes sports, dance, and English classes, is financed through One Heart and has made a wonderful difference for all of the children. Soon, thanks to One Heart, the children will even have traditional Bulgarian costumes to wear during their performances.

Teens turn gift exchange into One Heart opportunity

When Kathy Junk's daughter, Jasmine, read about the urgent need for windows at Slaveikov Orphanage, she and her friends decided to turn their annual gift exchange into an opportunity to raise money for One Heart.

Jasmine was very touched by the story describing the poor conditions at Slaveikov, and especially so since her brother, Mitko, is adopted from Bulgaria. At first, Jasmine wasn't sure how a group of 13 and 14 year old girls would take to the idea of donating their gift money rather than spending it on presents for each other, but everyone that she approached was excited about the idea. She decided to host a little party at her house with goodies, pop and games and then watch some video footage of older children living at an orphanage similar to Slaveikov that her mom had from her adoption work in Bulgaria. Jasmine also made a brightly wrapped box for the girls to place their donations in.

Ten girls attended and one mother was so touched that she sent along \$100 towards the cause in addition to her daughter's donation. The girls raised \$252 in all. They all went away feeling happy and satisfied to have helped these children, many their age, at least be able to be warm this winter, and they all want to do something like this again next year. We are all pretty proud of these girls!

Bakery project to be changed, expanded

Due to a change in orphanage directors and some property rights problems with the original building, the planned Bakery Project has been changed and expanded into a more powerful program: One Heart Bulgaria Transition Homes.

Teenage orphans about to leave their orphanages will be able

to spend a year in specially supervised housing where they will have access to job and life skills training through a professional social worker who will be hired by the government. One Heart plans to purches houses/apartments to renovate and use for this purpose. LDS Humanitarian Services has already shown an interest in working with us in outfitting and furnishing the new homes.

Families or organizations interested in being involved in this project are urged to contact One Heart. What a wonderful legacy it would be to have a transition home named after your own family or in memory of a loved one.


Gardner kids prepare gifts for orphans



One Heart dental program planning great things

Exciting things are happening with One Heart Bulgaria's dental program. Thanks to contacts made through our Dental Programs Director Jan Wray from Kaysville, UT, the LDS Academy of Dentists has decided to partner with One Heart Bulgaria to fund a \$350,000 dental clinic with all new equipment and supplies needed to give dental care to the orphans.

Jan, along with her dentist husband Dr. Sydney E. Wray, One Heart Bulgaria Board President Ivan Djambov, and a representative from the Academy, made a trip to Bulgaria in June to research all the possibilities for setting up the clinic as well as to make final arrangements for One Heart Bulgaria's Fall dental mission.

"Our team of 14 individuals (dentists, hygienists, dental assistants, etc.) will go to Bulgaria in September to provide dental care; they will work 12-hour days. We will be taking our [dental] units with us in September. They are owned by the academy and weigh 50 lbs. each. Each of my dental assistants will take one with them. Two grandmas are going just to console, rock the kids/babies." Arrangements will then be made to send more dentists and specialists (every year) on subsequent trips," reports Jan.

One Heart Bulgaria has partnered with another humanitarian organization, Bulgarian Child, to provide transportation for the children to and from the clinic.
