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## The Stringhams love the children of Gorna Koznitsa

The Scott and Kathy Stringham family have been dedicated sponsors for the Gorna Koznitsa orphanage since 2003. Gorna Koznitsa is home to 52 mentally handicapped and disabled children ages 7-19. The dilapidated facility is tucked away in a remote village making it difficult to access. The small orphanage staff at Gorna Koznitsa is constantly overwhelmed and discouraged by the children's many needs. Most of the children wet the beds and tear at their mattresses, creating a lot of mess and laundry, not to mention bathing time.

When asked why they chose to sponsor Gorna Koznitsa, Scott Stringham replied: "...we wanted to help those children who can't help themselves. Having children of our own, it is heart breaking to see that there are children who don't have parents or families to love and take care of them." With the help of the Stringham family's sponsorship, One Heart Bulgaria has been able to help alleviate some of the strains and needs at the orphanage by providing boiler repairs for the heating system, water heaters, and a large washing machine. Their sponsorship has also regularly provided for medicines, hygiene supplies, mattress replacements/covers, fresh fruits and vegetables, and detergents.

The Stringham family has enjoyed being in touch with their orphanage, commenting: "It has been rewarding to be involved with the One Heart Bulgaria organization. We've been able to see pictures of the orphanage and the children we have sponsored and it feels good to know we are helping to make their lives a little better. We know these children will receive their reward in heaven."

After reading the Oliver Twist story as part of his home schooling curriculum, Davin's mom explained to him that there are still orphans and orphanages in the world today, such as those in Bulgaria. Davin explained, "I was shocked to hear that some of these kids were poorly cared for. I wanted to do something to help." After looking up One Heart Bulgaria on the internet, Davin said, "My heart was filled with compassion for the children....I wanted to help them to have a better life. We decided to do a fundraiser with my friend Michael and his mom so that we could do something to make their lives a little brighter."

Michael added his thoughts, "I learned that no one is too young or unable to help those in need. You don't have to be a grownup or wealthy to make a difference in someone's life." Davin continued, "So, together we planned a pizza and movie night fundraiser for neighbors and friends. I handmade invitations explaining that all money would go to the poor orphanages in Bulgaria. We suggested that people donate \$20. The response we got was wonderful! We had about 14 children who came to our pizza and movie night held at our house." Michael said, "Davin and I have a goal. Our goal is to host more fundraiser events to raise enough money to provide playground equipment for all the orphanages supported by One-Heart Bulgaria!"

Eight year olds Davin and Michael also made large posters and did a presentation on Oliver Twist and their fundraiser at a local home schooling parents' meeting. They encouraged



other home schooling parents to try this project with their own children and were able to collect additional donations and hand out information about One Heart Bulgaria and the orphans.

## Family Dynamics International reports successful training trip, October 2008

Following up an April assessment, Roberta Stapley and Valerie Randall

completed a very successful training trip to Bulgaria in October in conjunction with One Heart Bulgaria. Ms. Stapley, CEO of Family Dynamics International (FDI), and her associate, Ms. Randall, created a 96-page Caregiver Training Manual for workers in Bulgarian orphanages, as well as a Goodness Character Curriculum for use with the children. Countless hours of donated time and energy, including beautiful original drawings by Becky Johnson, went into the development of the program, which was carefully translated to ensure proper use of the language and representation of the culture.

Training seminars were attended by orphanage directors, caregivers, social workers, psychologists, and government officials representing orphanages in Sofia, Plovdiv, Bratsigovo, Naretchen, and the Rodopi Mountains as well as areas outlying the main cities. The training sessions, which were attended by approximately 100 workers, were wel-

comed also by several vice-mayors as well as the mayor of Bratsigovo, who rolled out the red carpet with wonderful training facilities and accommodations.

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
shed by many of the participants in each of the cities as we closed the seminars," remarked Ms. Stapley. "We were overwhelmed with their sincere gratitude and expressions of heartfelt thanks for what had been taught and shared." Many participants expressed their desire for follow-up meetings, and a psychologist from Slaveikov orphanage request-

ed extra training manuals so that she could share the training she received with others.

Pending pilot assessments, FDI has committed to produce five more months of "Goodness Character" curriculum for the orphans, targeted for completion in the spring of 2009.


One Heart Bulgaria will give out wristbands and treats after the performances at the orphanages and hopes to follow up with music programs for the children.

### Hollie and Tony in Bulgarian orphanages as OHB interns



Tony Anderson, an LDS returned missionary who served in Bulgaria, and Hollie, his wife of two years, are internsconnected to One Heart Bulgaria. Hollie is the first Brigham Young University student to receive internship credit under this program.

Tony has been teaching Hollie to speak Bulgarian. They arrived in Bulgaria on Sept. 11, 2008 and have worked with the children of Sveta Marina and Bratsigovo orphanages. They will be in Bulgaria for a total of three months. Hollie tells about their experiences there:

I didn't know what to expect when I came to Bulgaria. I had learned a little bit about the culture from my husband and pre-internship courses at BYU, but I still didn't really know what kind of world I was entering. As I have come to know the people of this beautiful country, especially through the children in the orphanages I've been working in, I've grown to love them deeply and they have made their way into a special place in my heart.

As Tony and I spent our time in the Bratsigovo orphanage, home to mostly

teenage kids, we realized that they wanted so much to be with us and do things we like to do. One night as we were sitting and talking with them, they asked us about Halloween. We tried to explain the holiday to them the best that we could, but we could tell that they didn't really understand. We decided to plan a Halloween party for them, complete with all of the traditional Halloween rituals so that they could experience it for themselves.

We organized a party committee of kids in the orphanage, who were very excited to be in on the planning. We made decorations, doughnuts, and I even taught a group of girls Michael Jackson's "Thriller" dance, which we performed at both the younger kids' party and the older kids' party. It was amazing to me to see the proud looks of accomplishment on the face of Vasko, a 17-year-old boy, as he carved his very first Jack-O-Lantern. It touched my heart to form such close bonds with the small group of girls I taught the dance to, despite the language barrier. It was not only a huge relief, but so wonderful to see a large group of girls in the orphanage working together to prepare last minute decorations for the party.

These children never fail to warm my heart whenever I see them, and I am so happy that I am here with them. Everything I sacrificed to come seems so small and insignificant when I'm with these kids, and sometimes I wish I never had to leave them.

#### Message from One Heart Bulgaria president Deborah Dushku Gardner:

### Are economic conditions affecting charitable donations?

It seems everyone has been affected by the economic conditions here in the U.S. Gas and food prices have skyrocketed. The housing market is in deep trouble. As the economy slows, companies large and small are laying people off, creating unemployment for thousands of families. Many have lost their homes. The stock market has lost over a third of its value, affecting 401Ks, pension plans, retirement plans, and even money markets and no one knows when things will turn around. Some of the biggest and most famous investment banks in New York have collapsed or sold themselves to other institutions to avoid bankruptcy. It is predicted that nearly 1,000 small banks will close by the end of 2008. This is clearly a time of great financial uncertainty and even crisis. Little wonder people are anxious and concerned about their futures. So why are charitable donations are still trickling in?

Even though more and more individuals and families are finding themselves in financial struggles, many of them are still finding ways to give to others who are even more unfortunate than themselves. My heart is touched by the \$10 and \$25 donations that come in as well as the larger donations because I know many of you do not have much to spare at this time. My own family was under sever financial stress this past summer causing us to sell whatever valuable things we could and buying groceries on a credit card. It was a scary time and thankfully it did not last as long as it could have.

Donations have come in from many young children as well who have been touched by the knowledge that other children in the world have no parents and live in formidable conditions. Some of these children asked for donations instead of presents at their birthday parties. Some have sold things at school and others have put on talent show fundraisers. I want to thank the parents of these children for supporting them.

Bulgaria is also going through economical difficulties. Their gas prices are much higher than ours here in the USA and individuals' income is severely taxed. Their housing market has fallen and the

European Union has withdrawn millions of dollars of assistance due to corruption in the Bulgarian government. The Bulgarian government continues to skimp on the nutritional and medical needs of the orphans. Orphanage directors have turned to One Heart Bulgaria yet again for the children's immunizations and flu shots because the government will not pay for these expenses.

Giving to and helping these Bulgarian children feels so good! KNOWING you are making a difference in someone else's life brings great joy. THAT is why donations, however large or small, are still coming in. In addition, research has shown that when someone does a kind act seratonin is released in the brain, elevating their mood.

Also, when someone observes a kind act, the same reaction occurs in the brain. But I like to mainly focus on the feelings that come into my heart as each one of us pulls together to help these children. We are like their far away family. Thank you for all of your support and efforts to help!
